PART E: THE MEANING OF CHRISTMAS



In his little book, *The Purpose of Christmas*, pastor Rick Warren, says that "ironically, at most Christmas parties the person whose birthday we're supposed to be celebrating is completely ignored. He's never even mentioned". So we could pose that important question: *What are you celebrating this Christmas*? Would your answer be something like the following?

- "I'm celebrating that I got through my midsemesters."
- "I'm celebrating seeing my family."
- "I got a Christmas surprise bonus."

- "I get to skate on the pond at midnight."
- "I'm getting a new iPhone X."
- "I'm celebrating that I've finished all my shopping."
- "I'm not celebrating anything. I'm just trying to relax."
- "I get to go skiing!"
- "I get to eat all kind of neat foods and snacks galore!"
- "I got NHL hockey game tickets."
- "I'm going on a cruise."
- "I'm too busy trying to make ends meet. No time for celebrating."



Whether young or old, getting ready for Christmas can be absolutely exhausting, with all the running around, buying gifts, sending cards or twitting greetings, putting up outdoor and indoor decorations, shopping for food and drinks, attending and hosting parties. Naturally, the really young tots anxiously wait for Santa's visit. Let's not forget about cleaning up afterward, returning or exchanging gifts, and paying those bills we allowed to pile up for all the fun. In the end did we have or take the time to actually enjoy the real meaning of Christmas?

So why celebrate? First and foremost because it's a birthday party. Whose birthday? What happened to make us so happy? The most remarkable event in history took place. Jesus, the Son of God, was born in Bethlehem.

That piece of good news has resounded down through the ages, bringing hope, peace and joy to all, for God so loved us, his creatures, that he gave his only Son to us "so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life."

In the Incarnation, God became one of us, a human being, so we could understand what He is really like. It is a great mystery and wondrous in every way.



Just think of what an incredibly diverse universe He created for us. So many different things to see, feel, imagine, enjoy and with family and friends. Every human being is different. No two of us are exactly alike. Every one of us is a true original, not cloned, not replaceable, not recyclable, simply unique and priceless.

But, despite all this goodness in creation, something went awry, humanity got sidetracked by sinning. All through the centuries people were lost and they were searching for answers to the problems of evil, suffering, injustice, and mortality.

Philosophers and teachers came up with all sorts of answers (as they try to do today as well). But to no avail. Human beings had some understanding of God's love, but it was very limited.

This all changed when Jesus was born. God Himself came into our midst as human flesh, to communicate with us directly face-to-face. It was the best way to show how much He loved us.

Everything that exists, visible and invisible: energy and gravity; matter and anti-matter; stars and galaxies;



atoms and neutrons; molecules and muons; plant, trees and flowers; birds, fish and animals; angels and humankind; all were created out of love, for God is love itself.

His love is the reason we are alive. We do not exist by chance, by some accident. God was thinking of us even before He made the world. He designed that world with just the right qualities and physical characteristics so human beings could live in it.

His love for us moreover is unchanging. Everything else will change during our lifetime, but God's love is continuous, eternal, unceasing.

Jesus was born like other babies, wrapped in swaddling clothes and visited by neighbours and strangers seeking the truth. Of course Jesus did not remain a baby. He grew up to model the kind of life that pleases God, His Father.

But we must remember that in all this splendour of lights, rich aromas, and glittering presents, for many people, Christmas can be a time of sorrow and depression. They may not have the extra money to buy presents for their children, family, and friends. Others are saddened by past memories and by the absence of loved ones.

The reality is that there are the poor among us, the homeless, the abandoned. We can perform the works of mercy and love our less fortunate human beings among us.

We have the opportunity to look at Christmas each year in a new light, a different way, appreciating its significance and how to make it brighter for other people who may be less fortunate than us.

Jesus the Christ is our Saviour who died for our sins and was raised from the dead, who lives with us, who loves us, who teaches us the truth. He is the reason for celebrating Christmas!

Christmas can last all year round. Seeds can be sown year round. One just needs to begin.



Different organizations are trying to ameliorate life for others in some practical way. Students could participate in doing good deeds in many ways: food drives, clothing drives, gift baskets, visitations, serving at shelters, singing and storytelling to little boys and girsl or to shut-ins in senior homes. The list is endless.

Steve De Quintal reassures everyone that "truly there is a need for every gift" whether material, psychological or spiritual. See below for Steve's top 10 wish list. He shows that everyday items no longer needed by the owner may be of great use to someone else in need of just that very hing!! Steve identifies a receiving organization for the item. He works and lives in a specific neighbourhood and frequents a specific church and parish, but many of the ideas can be translated to other locales and environs. - Freerice.com rice donated, Pauline Books Stores (Dec. 2, Baby Jesus Birthday Party), Street Patrols (Nov. 26 and Dec. 3, on streets of downtown Toronto), Used Stamps, Used Christmas cards

But there are other ideas to also consider:

- Ask volunteer students to spend zero for seven days
- Take students to meet refugees. (eg Romero House , Toronto)
- Take students to Niagara to work with migrants on a fruit farm for a day.
 Take students on a Toronto night street patrol. (Anishnawabe)
- Take the same students to the same nursing home monthly for a year.
- Take students to Habitat for Humanity 3W theme park in Americus. Georgia, or volunteer for th elocal branch
 Take students to volunteer at a pregnancy centre for mothers in distress

- Take students to the offices of a pro-life organization, (e.g. Campaign Life Coalition, Toronto Right to Life, or the local version)
- Encourage students to learn more about preborn life and the extreme challenges faced by them, too often falling victims to a "throw-away" culture

One can appreciate that social justice comes in many forms, from child labour in developing countries' factories to inadequate education opportunities for indigenous populations. But one must never forget the absolute need to protect innocent human life, that same life made in the image of the Christ whose birthday is celebrated at Christmas.


